THE COLORECTAL MULTIDISCIPLINARY TEAM (MDT)

What is a multidisciplinary team (MDT)?

A group of health care disciplines meet together every week, to discuss the care of individual patients.

Their main focus is the clinical management of each patient's future care and treatment. The MDT links to the wider care team, in particular the patient's GP. This ensures that when treatment decisions are made, ongoing support and care is continued.

Who makes up the Colorectal MDT?

MDT Co-ordinator

This person arranges the meetings, and documents decisions made within the meetings.

Consultant Colorectal Surgeons

A senior Colorectal Surgeon who will consider the surgical options for patients.

Consultant Specialist Physicians

A senior doctor who diagnose cancer and refer onto the surgical team

Consultant Clinical Oncologist

A senior doctor who specialises in treating patients with radiotherapy and chemotherapy.

Consultant Radiologist

A senior doctor who determines the precise location and extent of a cancer in the body using imaging such as Computerised Tomography (CT) and PET (Positron Emission Tomography) scans

Consultant Histopathologist

A senior doctor who looks at tissue samples under a microscope to make a diagnosis and to grade the cancer

Colorectal Clinical Nurse Specialists

A registered nurse who has received additional training in bowel cancer and its treatment and care

Nurse Endoscopist

Registered nurse who has undergone specialist training in performing endoscopy i.e. colonoscopy, flexible sigmoidoscopy

Dietician

A registered practitioner trained in the nutritional requirements of patients.

Stoma Care Sister

A registered nurse trained in the management and care of stomas, colostomies, ileostomy, urostomies

Specialist Palliative Team Care member

A registered nurse who specialises in the management of the symptoms of cancer.
