#### An extraordinary year for an incredible team

The last year has been an extraordinary time for the National Health Service and quite unlike anything we have experienced in living memory.

It has been a year of terrible sadness for many communities who have suffered the health and economic impact of COVID-19. It has also been one of the hardest years for colleagues at the Harrogate and District NHS Foundation Trust (HDFT) and those in the wider health and social care sector

Over the last 12 months nearly 800 patients had been treated for COVID-19 in our hospital, 100 of whom were treated in critical care. Whilst 600 patients recovered and had been discharged home during that time, 160 patients lost their lives.

But it also must be remembered that although the year was dominated by COVID-19, we continued to treat patients who had other conditions.

Many of our colleagues have had to change or move their roles to cope with ever changing priorities and demands. Our clinical teams were faced with unprecedented circumstances regarding infection control, care for severely ill patients with different symptoms, supporting patients who could not have visitors and communicating with families who could not visit their loved ones. We have also undertaken care away from the hospital and health centres with over 118,000 visits conducted to people's homes.

Our 0-19 services saw dramatic changes to their way of working with children's centres and community facilities closed during lockdown. They had to adapt to home working and undertaking virtual assessments, whilst still providing face to face assessments and support for over 102,000 families.

2020/21 was on one hand extremely difficult and on the other

very uplifting as the response of members of the public was wonderful with the Trust receiving thousands of gifts, offers of help, hundreds of hours of the time of volunteers.

The development of vaccines to combat COVID-19 was a hugely poignant moment for the world as a whole, and a sign that things will get better. However, moving forward, we



now face additional pressures. Waiting lists and waiting times have grown as it was not possible to sustain planned admissions, and for the coming year it is a major priority to return these services to pre-pandemic levels so that we can provide the treatments needed as soon as possible.

Every single person who works for HDFT and Harrogate Integrated Facilities (HIF) has made an enormous contribution and huge difference in the last year and we would like to thank them for their dedication, hard work and commitment. In addition, we must not forget about the sterling work of our partners and for the school's which remained open for the children of essential workers, so we could continue to do our jobs.

#### Our 0-19 services

Much of the spotlight during the COVID-19 pandemic was on hospital based services, and we wanted to highlight the particular contribution of school nurses, health visitors, and the teams they work with.

Not only did they have to adapt to working from home and providing some support virtually, they have also been faced with the unintended consequences of lockdown and the impact this has had on vulnerable children and families in particular. Lockdown suppressed the COVID-19 virus, but led to an increase in issues affecting the safeguarding of children, and our teams have responded remarkably.

#### **SIGNIFICANT** SAFEGUARDING **CONCERNS**

This is deeply distressing for the children and families involved, but also for our colleagues. It is also likely that this will increase further as lockdown is eased.

#### **INCREASE**

as a result of disrupted routines and behaviours; overcrowding; isolation from family support networks and financial pressures. Tensions in family relationships have resulted in an escalation in domestic abuse.

#### **SAFEGUARDING PRFCFPTORSHIP**

To ensure effective and safe practice, robust preceptorship and training will be provided to meet individual need. This will also enable the skills that are required to represent HDFT 0-19 teams as a key member of multi-agency safeguarding systems, an advocate for vulnerable children and to identify safeguarding concerns and take appropriate action.




